As the clock's bell pronounces midnight, strange things begin to happen: hungry mice are closing in, walls disappear, her bed is moving through the house-the Christmas tree is growing in the parlor-and so is she! Clara is frightened by the mice, and runs to protect the Nutcracker doll, but discovers the Nutcracker is growing, too. The Nutcracker calls upon Fritz's toy soldiers, now also grown, to battle the mice. Clara helps the Nutcracker defeat the mice and the wicked Mouse King.

The Nutcracker has been liberated through her courageous defeat of the Mouse King and turned into a Prince.

He takes her away to his kingdom, surrounded by the dancing snowflakes and led by their Snow King and his Queen.

After a long voyage, Clara and the Nutcracker Prince arrive at the gates of the Kingdom of Sweets, greeted by angels.

The Sugar Plum Fairy then summons countless representatives of different nations, representing a wide range of sweet and delicious delicacies. After the festivities of the sweets and dancing, the Sugar Plum Fairy and her Cavalier perform virtuoso dances in Clara's honor. Listen for the special sound of the celesta, a new instrument for which this is the first know piece composed.

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
OK, But what makes BALLET so GREAT??
